On The Way

The New Clothes of Easter

Today Saint Paul proclaims to us, "You have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory" (Col 3:3 -4). It's a curious passage. What does it mean that our life is *hidden*? And doesn't that kind of defeat the purpose? Shouldn't it be revealed to us fully, so that we can live it?

But when we reflect on the Apostle's words, we must acknowledge that there is something foreign and strange about Easter, something that we don't quite grasp. Indeed, something *hidden*. The first Christians had the same experience. The risen Lord suddenly appears to them...and just as suddenly disappears.

Consider Easter in comparison to Christmas, the Church's other principal feast. We enter into Christmas so much more easily and comfortably. In fact, we rush into it way ahead of time! Stores and commercials start celebrating Christmas months before its arrival. At least Easter's elusiveness means that it can't be completely subsumed by consumerism.

Another example is the great writer G.K. Chesterton. He has many poems about Christmas, but not one about Easter (at least, that I can find). Perhaps that's because Christmas was more in keeping with his overall childlike way of thinking. But I suspect there's more involved.

We understand the events surrounding Christmas because they're something we've all experienced. Indeed, the whole meaning of Christmas is that Christ has come to share our life. The whole meaning of Easter is that Christ has come to share *His* life. And that is something foreign and new to us.

Or compare the Easter season to Lent. Here's the dirty little secret: most Catholics prefer Lent to Easter. I began to suspect this early in my priesthood, when I noticed that people were motivated and focused during Lent but lacked the same purpose and resolve during Easter. Of course, nobody wants to admit this, because we should appreciate our Lord's resurrection more than His death.

Again, Lent focuses on things we already know: sin, suffering, and death. We can enter into those mysteries more easily because we've encountered them before. But we don't know how to live a risen life. We've never done it before. Not even Lazarus could teach people about it. He was raised back to natural life, not to the supernatural life of the risen Christ.

In the ancient Church those baptized at Easter were given new white garments as symbols of their new life. And I remember that as a boy (but for different reasons), Easter was likewise a time for new clothes. That is an apt image for learning Easter. Saint Paul tells us to "put on the Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom 13:14). We have to learn how to wear our new Easter clothes. Only in this case, the clothes don't get "broken in" by us; we must adjust to them.

Our life is indeed hidden. Let us pursue it. Like the disciples who raced to the tomb, let us hasten to the risen Lord, anxious to know that we've been raised with Him and to learn how to wear our Christian dignity.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Christ is risen!

The weather at this time of year always seems to cooperate with Easter. At least in our hemisphere, and in our area. There is new life all around us. What was dead and bleak just a month ago is now alive again, as if all creation is proclaiming new life. The covid situation (at least, as of this writing) is similar. There seems to be new life where just a few months ago there was only death, sickness, isolation, distancing, and coverings.

Now, these are tempting analogies to Easter, but they both fall short. Point is, Easter is about more than just "life after death." We find that concept in every religion and myth in the world and throughout history. But our faith is different. A mere "afterlife" is not actually what we proclaim and celebrate today.

First, we celebrate life *through* death, not merely after it. Christ's resurrection is the fruit of His death. This is what He Himself taught just prior to His crucifixion: "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (Jn 12:24). As we also heard Saint Paul proclaim on Palm Sunday, it was *because* Christ became "obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" that God "greatly exalted Him" (Phil 2:8-9).

Second, unlike Lazarus, Christ rose to *new life*, not merely to the life as it was before. The risen One possesses more than just the "afterlife." He possesses the life that has conquered death. He lives to die no more. And He shares this new life with us. Thus, heaven is not merely "afterlife." We begin living this new life already in this world. Heaven is the fulfillment of the life begun in Baptism, "the life which is life indeed" (I Tim 6:19).

May we rejoice in what the risen Christ bestows. First, the conviction in life through death – that in our sufferings and challenges, and even in our failures, we can find a path to new life. And, second, the joy that already we share His glory and have received the dignity of being called to holiness in Him.

Be assured of the prayers of all the priests at Saint James Parish. Through intercession of our Lady, Saint Joseph, and Saint James, may the Lord grant you His Easter peace and bless you always.

4 de abril de 2021 Domingo de Pascua

Queridos amigos en Cristo,

¡Cristo ha resucitado!

El clima en esta época del año siempre parece cooperar con la Semana Santa, al menos en nuestro hemisferio y en nuestra área. Hay nueva vida a nuestro alrededor. Lo que estaba muerto y sombrío hace apenas un mes está vivo de nuevo, como si toda la creación estuviera proclamando nueva vida. La situación asociada con el Covid-19 (por lo menos, al escribir esta carta) es similar. Parece haber nueva vida cuando hace unos meses sólo había muerte, enfermedad, aislamiento y distanciamiento.

Aunque estas son analogías tentadoras para la Pascua, se quedan cortas. El punto es que la Pascua significa más que "vida después de la muerte". Encontramos este concepto en todas las religiones y mitos del mundo y a lo largo de la historia. Nuestra fe es diferente. El día de hoy, proclamamos y celebramos algo más que el "más allá".

Primero, celebramos la vida *a través* de la muerte, no sólo después de ella. La resurrección de Cristo es el fruto de Su muerte. Esto es lo que Él mismo enseñó justo antes de Su crucifixión: "En verdad, en verdad os digo: si el grano de trigo no cae en tierra y muere, queda solo; pero si muere, da mucho fruto." (Juan 12:24) Como proclamó San Pablo el Domingo de Ramos, fue *porque* Cristo llegó a ser "obediente hasta la muerte, y muerte en una cruz" que Dios "lo engrandeció y le dio el Nombre que está sobre todo nombre." (Filipenses 2:8-9)

En segundo lugar, a diferencia de Lázaro, Cristo se elevó a *una nueva vida,* no sólo a la vida como lo era antes. El Resucitado posee algo más que el "más allá". Posee la vida que ha conquistado la muerte. Ya no vive para morir. Y Él comparte esta nueva vida con nosotros. Por lo tanto, el cielo no es simplemente el "mas allá". Empezamos a vivir esta nueva vida ya en este mundo. El cielo es el cumplimiento de la vida iniciada en el Bautismo, la "vida verdadera". (1 Timoteo 6:19)

Que nos regocijamos en lo que Cristo resucitado otorga. En primer lugar, la convicción en la vida a través de la muerte – que, en nuestros sufrimientos y desafíos, e incluso en nuestros fracasos, podemos encontrar un camino hacia una nueva vida. Y, segundo, el gozo que ya compartimos Su gloria y hemos recibido la dignidad de ser llamados a la santidad en Él.

Tengan la certeza que todos los sacerdotes de la Parroquia St. James oren por ustedes. Por la intercesión de nuestra Señora, San José y Santiago, que el Señor les conceda Su santa paz y les bendiga siempre.




