#### **On The Way**

Have yourself a Eucharistic Christmas

"O come, let us adore him" is one of the most familiar Christmas refrains. It's not just an invitation to visit or look at him. It is the call to bestow upon the Child in the manger what can be given to God alone: *adoration*. Sure, we often say that a baby is "adorable." But *O come, let us adore him* is not a statement about the cuteness of the Christ Child. It is a profession of faith: this Child is God and therefore deserves our adoration.

Adoration is the highest form of prayer. By adoration we worship God not because of anything He has done for us and not because of anything he might do for us, but simply because He *is*. Thus we come to the infant Christ in adoration. As we look upon him in his infancy, we set aside all prayers of thanksgiving, petition, and contrition. We simply gaze upon him because he is, true God and true man.

*O come, let us adore him.* This phrase also reminds us of Eucharistic adoration. This side of heaven, this invitation is most perfectly fulfilled when we gaze upon the Sacred Host and adore Jesus in the Eucharist. This should heighten our awareness of the relationship between Christmas and the Mass, between Bethlehem and the altar, between the manger and the Communion rail.

God is everywhere. We can adore him spiritually wherever we are. (In fact, that is what we did during the lockdown when we couldn't receive the Eucharist: we made a spiritual communion.) But just as at Christ's birth, God was physically and visibly present in one specific place – the manger in Bethlehem – so at the moment of the consecration he is substantially present in a specific place – the altar in church.

If we lived at the time of Christ's birth, we would have raced to Bethlehem because he was present there as nowhere else. We would not have offered the lame excuses, "Well, God is everywhere, and I can worship him anywhere." In the same way, now that Christ is present in the Eucharist we ought to hasten to Mass. Mary, Joseph and the shepherds looked upon the Son of God as he appeared in our human nature. We look upon the same Son of God – just as present to us – as he appears under the form of bread.

The infant Christ announces to us the nourishment of the Eucharist. The very name of the town in which he is born, Bethlehem, means "House of bread." He is placed in a *manger* – literally, a "feedbox." It's as though even from his birth he proclaims, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world" (Jn 6:51).

Finally, from his birth our Lord points us to his sacrifice. The shepherds, who tend the very sheep to be sacrificed in the Temple, come to adore the Lamb of God, whose sacrifice will take away the sins of the world.

O come, let us adore him. May the infant Christ grant you an increased devotion to him in the Eucharist. May God grant you the peace and joy of the Eucharistic Christ – born in Bethlehem, present on our altar, sacrificed for our salvation, and given for our nourishment.

For an emergency requiring the sacraments of the Church during this time, please call our office at 703-532-8815 and follow the menu prompts for the priests' emergency line.




#### Solemnity of Mary, Holy Mother of God



#### Christmas Letter - 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Today is born our Savior, Christ the Lord (I.k 2:11).

How blessed are we to celebrate with profound joy the birth of Jesus, Son of God and Son of Mary and Joseph! He is "Light from Light," and for more than 2,000 years, we have walked in the light that he brought the world at his birth.

Born in the midst of darkness, Jesus' light heals the world. He calls us in turn to carry that light and, by his grace, to illuminate a world in desperate need of his compassion, love and healing. The Wise Men followed a star shining in the sky, and, because of their trust and faithfulness, they saw the face of Christ. Likewise, each time we choose to follow the Lord and share his light, he transforms us little by little, and we grow closer to the newborn King, the King of Kings.

As we reflect on the challenges we have experienced this past year, we should consider whether we journey through our circumstances like the Wise Men, journeying closer to God in trust. This Christmas season, reflect on the word Emmanuel, which means "God with us." No matter our challenges and experiences, God is with us and wants to accompany us on our earthly journey.

Throughout this Christmas season and into the coming year, we have a unique opportunity to welcome Christ into our lives more deeply. In anticipation of our Golden Jubilee in 2024, I have called for two preparatory years in advance. The first year, which began on November 21, is devoted to the Eucharist. I encourage you to participate in one of the many 40 Hours Eucharistic devotions taking place throughout the Diocese this Christmas season. In adoration of Our Lord, we remember that he truly is with us—he is Emmanuel.

At this time of great joy and celebration, let us ask Our Lord to help us grow in love of him and of our neighbor and to trust in him just as the Wise Men trusted in him. He is our Light, our God.

Please be assured of my prayers for you, and may the peace and abundant blessings that only Jesus can give be yours at Christmas, throughout the New Year, and always.


