On The Way

Catechesis on Creation: Man and Woman, III

The man's reaction to the creation of woman is one of the most beautiful lines in scripture. Upon seeing her the man acclaims, "This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man" (Gen 2:23). These are the first words spoken by man. They are a prayer (a hymn, perhaps) of thanksgiving and praise for woman. He looks upon her and sees not a competitor or rival but a companion and complement so that he can fulfill his mission and realize his purpose. He finally has an equal with whom he can "partner" in the mission entrusted to him by God. Even more important, he finds in woman someone to whom he can entrust *himself*. Which leads to the next verse.

"Therefore a man leaves his father and his mother and cleaves to his wife, and they become one flesh" (Gen 2:24). This one line summarizes the purpose of the differences between man and woman. Those differences are ordered toward the "one flesh" union that can only exist between them. Two men cannot become one flesh, nor can two women. Only the unique differences between man and woman make this union possible. Their becoming one flesh is found most of all in a child.

The Church calls the purpose of these differences *complementarity*. We encounter complementarity first in the physical relationship of man and woman: their bodies are designed for one another. Indeed, their physical differences only make sense when seen in relation to one another. The male body can only be understood completely in relation to the female, and vice versa.

Further, since the human person is the body/soul union, the male/female complementarity is more than just skin deep, so to speak. What is distinctly masculine complements the feminine – and vice versa. Man and woman have not only a physical but also a genuine psychological and emotional complementarity.

Genesis 2 concludes with a significant verse: "And the man and his wife were both naked, and were not ashamed" (Gen 2:26). This one sentence summarizes the harmony intended for them from the beginning. There are unashamed because they both are at peace – in harmony – with their bodies. They are comfortable in their own skin, as we might say, and thus at peace with the other's body also.

This final verse touches on the harmony that that God willed to exist in all of creation from the beginning. This "original justice" is constituted first by the perfect harmony within man himself – that is, the perfect integration of his intellect, will, and passions. Second, there is perfect harmony – no division or conflict whatsoever – between man's body and soul. Then the relationship between man and woman is one of perfect harmony. Because man and woman in paradise experience no division between body and soul, they can be naked and not ashamed. Finally, the Genesis narrative indicates a harmony between man and all creation. Man is the faithful steward of creation, which does not pose a threat or frustration to him.

Next week we turn to chapter three of Genesis, where we will see how sin harms but not does completely destroy the design of God.

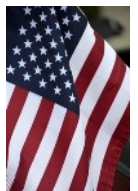

STATEMENT OF THE BISHOPS OF THE PROVINCE OF BALTIMORE AND THE ARCHDIOCESE OF WASHINGTON

Lifting the General Dispensation from the Obligation to Attend Mass

We, the Catholic Bishops of the Province of Baltimore and the Archdiocese of Washington, give thanks to Almighty God for the progress our country has made in curbing the coronavirus pandemic. The average number of new cases of COVID-19 continues to decline due to the observance of safety protocols and the increase of the availability of the vaccine. At this time, many places in our region are enjoying a return to some sense of normalcy.

Therefore, we are lifting the dispensation of the Sunday and Holy Days Mass obligation in the Archdiocese of Baltimore, the Archdiocese of Washington, and the Dioceses of Arlington, Richmond, Wheeling-Charleston, and Wilmington and reinstating that obligation beginning on Saturday, June 26, 2021 and Sunday, June 27, 2021. We welcome and encourage the Faithful to return to full in-person participation of the Sunday Eucharist, the source and summit of our Catholic faith (cf. Code of Canon Law, canon 1246-1247 and Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2180).

This obligation does not apply to those who are ill; those who have reason to believe that they were recently exposed to the coronavirus, another serious or contagious illness; those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility; or those with serious underlying health conditions. One should consult his or her local pastor if questions arise about the obligation to attend Mass (Canon 1245 and the Catechism of the Catholic Church n. 2181).

Safety protocols and other liturgical directives in each diocese remain in effect until modified or revoked by the respective Diocesan Bishop.

Let us continue to be united in prayer for one another and for an end to the global pandemic.

DECLARACIÓN DE LOS OBISPOS DE LA PROVINCIA DE BALTIMORE Y LA ARQUIDIÓCESIS DE WASHINGTON

Levantamiento de la Dispensa General de la Obligación de Asistir a Misa

Nosotros, los obispos católicos de la provincia de Baltimore y la Arquidiócesis de Washington, damos gracias a Dios Todopoderoso por el progreso que nuestro país ha logrado para frenar la pandemia de coronavirus. El número promedio de nuevos casos de COVID-19 continúa disminuyendo debido a la observancia de los protocolos de seguridad y al aumento de la disponibilidad de la vacuna. En este momento, muchos lugares de nuestra región están disfrutando de una vuelta a la normalidad.

Por lo tanto, levantamos la dispensa de la obligación de la misa dominical y de los días santos de precepto en la Arquidiócesis de Baltimore, la Arquidiócesis de Washington y las Diócesis de Arlington, Richmond, Wheeling-Charleston y Wilmington, y restablecemos esa obligación a partir del sábado 26 de junio y el domingo 27 de junio de 2021. Damos la bienvenida y animamos a los fieles a que regresen a la plena participación en persona en la eucaristía dominical, fuente y cumbre de nuestra fe católica (cf. Código de Derecho Canónico, cánones 1246-1247 y Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, n. 2180).

Esta obligación no se aplica a los enfermos; quienes tengan motivos para creer que estuvieron expuestos recientemente al coronavirus, otra enfermedad grave o contagiosa; aquellos que estén confinados en su hogar, un hospital o un centro de enfermería; o aquellos con problemas de salud graves. Se debe consultar a su párroco si surgen preguntas sobre la obligación de asistir a la misa (canon 1245 y Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica n. 2181).

Los protocolos de seguridad y otras directivas litúrgicas en cada diócesis permanecen vigentes hasta que el Obispo diocesano respectivo los modifique o revoque.

Sigamos unidos en oración los unos por los otros y por el fin de la pandemia mundial.

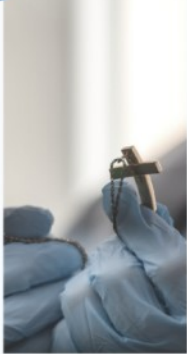

The Peter's Pence Collection occurs yearly on the Sunday closest to June 29, the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, as a sign that Catholics around the world are joined together in support of the Holy Father.

A Concrete Sign of Mercy

The concrete participation in the needs of the universal ecclesial community has taken different forms throughout history. Collections and donations by the individual faithful or entire local churches raise awareness that all the baptized are called to materially sustain the work of evangelization and, at the same time, to help the poor in whatever way possible. By doing so, they build up the Church so that it will continue to minister to all for generations to come.

During his apostolic visit to Bangui in the Central African Republic in 2015, Pope Francis visited the city's pediatric hospital with a donation of medicines and a promise that he would not forget the country's children. With contributions raised to support Peter's Pence, the Holy Father kept that promise to the children of Bangui

by founding a new facility in 2017. The existing hospital was renovated, and a new facility specifically for malnourished children was constructed. In a March 2019 message, Pope Francis described the hospital as "a concrete sign of mercy" originating with his 2015 visit.

A Tradition of Support for the Holy Father

Support for such papal efforts has its roots in the scriptural message to take care of the poor and is an expression of unity with the Holy Father. Peter's Pence expresses this unity in two ways: through the ongoing activities of the Holy See and through the charitable works of the Holy Father on behalf of those most in need.

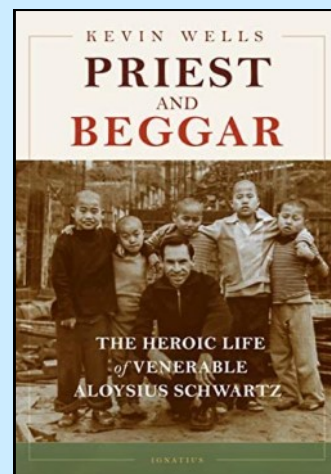
