

On The Way

Catechesis on Creation: Creation's Priest

One great mistake of the ancient pagans was to confuse the Creator and his creation. They viewed created things – sun, water, trees, etc. – as divine and thus made them objects of worship. We moderns might think that their error was due to the lack of a scientific knowledge. In fact, it was due to bad theology. They failed to understand the proper relationship of the Creator and His creation. However, even in their error the pagans intuited something true: that creation and worship are intimately connected.

The first chapter of Genesis provides the proper corrective to pagans (both ancient and modern) and shows the right relationship between God and creation. First, the opening phrase – "God created the heavens and the earth" – robs all created things of any divine status. It is God alone who brought them into being. All those objects that the

pagans worshipped as divine are shown to be not divine but God's creatures.

At the same time, the first chapter of Genesis also describes how creation *is* involved in worship: all of creation is brought into being for the purpose of giving praise and glory to God. As explained last week, the entire Genesis account depicts the creation of a temple and of its inhabitants. The final creature to be placed in the temple is the one who will preside over the cosmic liturgy. This is the significance of man's being created last: he is the priest of creation.

Or, as some have proposed, we can understand the creation account as a liturgical procession. Just as at Mass the various ministers enter the church in procession, so in creation God causes a procession of participants: sun, moon, and stars; dry land and sea; fish, birds, and animals on the ground. Of course, the last person in the liturgical procession is the one who presides – the priest. Again, man comes last in the creation account because he is the priest presiding over creation's praise of the Creator.

Man summarizes all creation – mineral, plant, animal, rational – in himself. He is the only creature about whom God first reflects about before creating: "Then God said, 'Let us make man in our image, after our likeness..." As the one sharing God's image and likeness, man possesses a higher dignity and responsibility than does any other creature. Apart from him, creation is mute. By his likeness to God, man presides over creation and gives it a rational voice in its praise of the Creator.

This orientation of all creation to worship is confirmed by what happens after the sixth day: "And on the seventh day God finished his work which he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work which he had done. So, God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all his work which he had done in creation" (Gen 2:2-3).

The sabbath is, of course, the time for worship. The six days of creation are ordered toward and designed for that seventh day, that time to worship and to rest in God. Thus, one of the simplest things we can do to observe the meaning of creation is to observe the sabbath – to worship and rest as God did.






