

From Our Seminarian



Robby Renner just completed his first year at Mount St. Mary's Seminary. A recent graduate of the University of Mary Washington, Robby is spending this summer with us as part of his training. Please give him a warm welcome when you see him.

I am enjoying my stay at St. James Parish and look forward to what the Lord has in store for me here. I just finished my first year of formation at Mount Saint Mary's Seminary with five years till ordination. My first assignment in a parish has been an adjustment that I am enjoying. It is great to return to a familiar neighborhood; the local coffee shops and nearby Chipotle were my usual stops

after soccer practices at Bishop O'Connell High School.

One of the biggest adjustments is sleeping in a bed. Working as a trail guide for the past three summers, beds were an amenity that we were not privy to in the backcountry. For a week at a time I would lead a group of teenage boys at Rocky Mountain National Park. In many ways, it was as if I became the parent of ten rambunctious high school boys. We were schooled for weeks ahead of our departure on all the ways things could go wrong. This knowledge was of little comfort as we hiked off and on trails. A healthy dose of fear was a constant companion, along with the ever-present bear spray on our hips!

Prior to those trips, I received training in what I would experience. As we see in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus did the same for His apostles. They are told what they will do with their lives in order to follow Him; and Jesus encourages them not to be afraid. The reason? They are "worth more than sparrows" in God's eyes. (Matthew 10:31). Seems quite trite really.

What is our worth? Everything. Christ replaces the Levitical sacrifice of small birds for purification with His own body. In both cases we must be cleansed of what is plaguing us. Though we say that we *are not worthy that He should enter under our roof,* Christ says we are healed by His Incarnation and the Eucharist as much as we let Him. The sacrifice we make for new life is no longer the body of sparrows, but the body of our King. Every Sunday is a reminder of what He offers us, which is healing, safety, and love. The communion we have with God upon reception of the host in Mass unites us to His redeeming and sanctifying body that gives life to our souls so we can serve beyond fear.

We must remember God has allowed us to be worthy of the Body of Christ; we do not need to fear letting Him touch every second of our life. In return, we can give something worth more than many sparrows for our sanctification. **~Robby Renner**

Public policy and immigration

Our Catholic teaching affirms the right of governments to defend their borders and to regulate migration. In the United States, however, a combination of deficiencies in our existing immigration laws and inconsistent enforcement of those laws has produced an untenable situation. There are millions of undocumented workers who have lived and worked here for years, begun families, and made the U.S. their home, but have no viable pathway to citizenship. Each year two students are honored with the prestigious Msgr. Paul V. Heller/Sister Helen Maureen, IHM award. Formerly known as the Father Mullarkey/Sister Calista Award, it highlights 8th grade students who excel in the classroom and beyond. This year's winners, Michael

Awad and Caroline DeLuca, are both wonderful examples of academic excellence, service and athletic accomplishment.

The younger of two sons, Michael has served both the school and parish as a volunteer tutor and with our Fish Fry(s). A keen tennis player as well as runner, Michael also found time to play CYO basketball. "I've been playing tennis since I was three but really got serious 3-4 years ago. Mr. Borman (parishioner Matt Borman) is my coach and I learned from him never to give up, just keep trying." Michael recounts a tough match where "I was losing pretty badly but I kept at it." Although he lost that one match Michael nevertheless took much from it: "I kept trying and I felt good [at the end]. At least I had tried! I felt better knowing that." This lesson translated into the classroom where he felt he wasn't doing as well as he'd like in History. Instead of giving up or being satisfied with his results, he studied harder and asked for help.

Michael will attend Bishop O'Connell in the fall where he hopes to continue his love of service ("I just feel good doing good. It really brightens my day helping people"), sports and math. While many of us are not sure of a career path well into adulthood, Michael was clear: he wants to be a radiologist. He credits his friends at St. James for making him "who I am today. I wouldn't be the same person without them." Asked to give a younger version of himself advice he doesn't hesitate, "Go with your gut. [Mine] has led me down the right path so far!"

Caroline DeLuca is the fourth generation to be associated with Saint James. Like Michael, she has one sibling, a younger sister. Caroline also excelled academically and was very involved in service, as a student ambassador, event volunteer and peer tutor with the National Junior Honor Society. She played tennis, basketball and sang with the Choir. An avid swimmer, Caroline does more before 10:00am than most of us do in a day. We are exhausted just thinking of swimming no less than 3000 meters in a morning. Swimming "keeps me organized and has helped me with time management. It's also taught me to keep doing things even when they get hard. Sometimes you have to work through the pain and push yourself. It's worth it!"

Caroline speaks animatedly about her love of service: "It feels good to do service; it's rewarding to meet people who need your help and to be able to see the difference you can make." Both Caroline and Michael cite Math as their favorite subject. "I'd like to be an engineer or a pediatrician; and work for the government. I like the idea of giving back to my country." As she heads to Georgetown Visitation in the fall, she has plans to continue with her community service, swimming, leadership roles and perhaps "try a new sport." Caroline cites her close friendships as something she valued most at Saint James. "We have a really great community here." To her younger self she'd counsel to "never give up and work hard."

Family vacations and camps await both of them this summer. Though they'll go on to new adventures in August, we are sure to hear more of these talented teenagers. More than the grades they received or the medals they won, Caroline and Michael are successes because of who they are: students who have not hesitated to give back; disciples who truly are "doers of the word."

TWO WEDDINGS (1927 & 1943) - THEN AND NOW

Until the era of Vatican II, many weddings between a Catholic and a person of another religious tradition took place in the rectory parlor. Here are the stories of two such celebrations at St. James.

The first wedding, on December 27, 1927, took place during Father Van's tenure, and is described in a fairly irreverent letter written around New Year's Day 1928. The writer, who lived in St. James all his adult life and was deeply involved in the life of the parish, offered this version of the wedding of a cousin in the parlor at St. James.

After the event was about an hour behind schedule we drove to the Rectory where we were greeted by the affable pastor. I do not know where the bridal party waited while the guests were being placed around the wall in the pastor's study. The groom's Mother was given a "special place reserved for her" and escorted to it by the pastor. Then when all was in readiness the bride and groom marched in. When all was still except the bride's fluttering heart and the groom's rattling knees, Father Van started kidding them. He said that he hoped they had given ample consideration to the serious step they were about to take and both of them turning back the speedometer of time already. (The bride was 38 at the time of the marriage.) And then with the marriage license in one hand and a prayer book in the other he repeated the service necessary and then the best man pulled a box out of his pocket and extracted the ring and the bridesmaid undressed the bride's gloved hand and then with the ring placed and the marriage completed we all kissed one another and shook hands and asked about all the relations and friends and when that was done we went back home and wondered what it was all about. Now that's the end of my story because they lived happily ever after.

In 1943, another bride and groom were welcomed to the rectory parlor by Father Mullarkey. The woman who was married that day, another lifelong parishioner, told this story at the celebration of the 100th Anniversary of St. James.

The Sisters hold a very special place in my memories. They remember you even after you've left (the school). For instance, Harry and I were married in the Rectory in mid-April. When we approached Father Mullarkey, there in front of him were two prie-dieux,* nicely covered with white linen doilies – and pinned to mine was the season's first daisy. These touching wishes from the Sisters carried us through the rest of the ceremony beautifully. First stop afterwards was to the Convent so they could meet my new husband – and see my dress.

Today, Catholic brides and grooms know that their intendeds of other faith traditions are welcome in St. James church. A team of wedding coordinators helps to make sure that happens. In the late 1980s, sacristan Carmel Eitt began this service with Joan Hyndman, and now 12 wedding coordinators volunteer under the leadership of Linda Doyle. Coordinators meet with the bride two or three months before the ceremony, attend (and sometimes direct) the rehearsal and are on hand for the wedding. They decorate the church, prepare the altar, welcome the bridal party, cue the organist. *"We get them up the aisle,"* Linda says. *"This is a most joyful ministry."*
