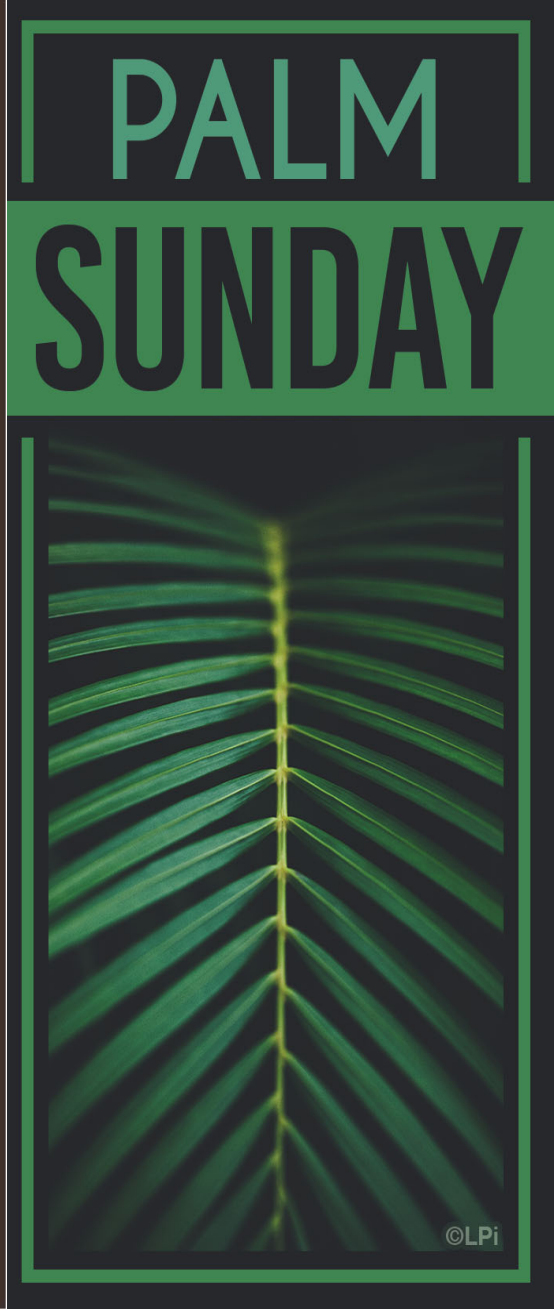

From Our Pastor



When I was young, my mother, who was an artist, taught me how to paint. I was fascinated when she told me to mix the colors yellow and blue together and behold, green appeared. It was amazing to me as a child how one thing, paint, could cause such a change. But, isn't it true with our lives? One thing can change us forever. At times, what we mix has drastic effects upon us.

During today's Mass, we hear two different parts of one story, that, like two different colors, combine to form one lasting masterpiece. During the Procession of the Palms we hear the words of Luke as he describes Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem, an occasion of great joy and celebration; We also hear, later in the Mass, from Luke again as he relates Jesus' last days in Jerusalem, his Passion, and his sacrifice on the Cross – a time of sorrow and mourning. Luke's narratives provide us with two different types of color all in the same week – the vibrant and pulsating colors of joy and the muted, grey and black tones of sorrow and, seeming, loss.

And so it is for us. We have all had weeks that start great and end badly. And, at times, it is easy for us to find ourselves stuck in the darker shades of our lives' pallets – easy for us to feel sorry for ourselves, easy to feel embittered, easy to surrender and do nothing in the face of adversity. We can find ourselves far from those joyous, vibrant shades of color that kicked our week off. When this happens, when we find ourselves on the darker sides of our pallets, we need to remember that Christ's love for us beams like a ray of bright yellow in the darkness. A beam that, if we follow it, will always lead us back to Him and His eternal love for us. Within His love, we can find the comfort and strength necessary to journey back over to the more colorful side of our pallet so that we can start painting a brighter picture with His guidance and care.

As we move into Holy Week, take some time and reflect on the colors with which you are painting. Think about how those colors contribute to your life's painting, and the life paintings of those around you. If you find that you, or those around you, are painting with too dark a shade, help each other look for that bright yellow of God's love and follow it back to its source. There you will find peace and spiritual nourishment to continue your life's journey,

Also, remember that celebrations like Easter can be a hard time for some of the people in our lives. Please take time to reach out to your family and friends to see how they are doing. Take time to talk to them, take time to heal old wounds, and to settle past differences - infuse their world with the bold hues of God's love, and don't let them forget that help is always available both from Him and from more earthly and immediate sources.

The colors that Luke painted his word pictures with were both vibrant and dark – but they combine in a week to create the brightest shades of all – the multi-hued dawn of Easter Sunday, and the brilliant, dazzling white of God's triumph over death in His resurrection.

Tenebrae Service – Monday, April 15

On Monday, April 15, at 7:30pm, St. James will celebrate our annual Tenebrae service. Tenebrae, in Latin, means “darkness” or “shadows,” and this service, with Gospel readings, and music from the St. James Adult Traditional Choir, recounts the events of Holy Week. During the service, the Church is lit by candlelight from seven candles. As each Gospel reading concludes a candle is extinguished, eventually plunging the Church into darkness.

A loud noise is then heard, signifying the shutting of Christ’s tomb.

However, a lit candle suddenly appears in the darkness to remind us of Christ’s resurrection and triumph. After this beautiful service, all leave in contemplative silence to reflect on the meaning of Holy Week and Christ’s resurrection.



St. James Social Outreach Committee-Focus on Hunger

- And throughout the year, St. James' parishioners respond to requests to provide food for specific activities directed at serving the poor in our area.

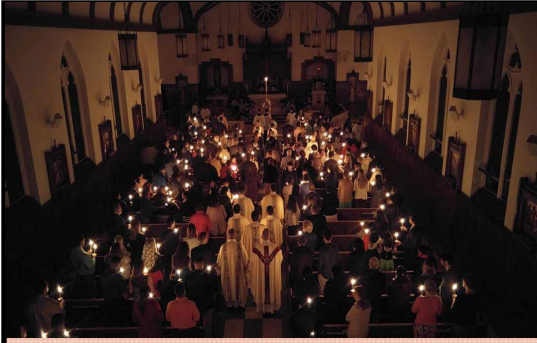

THE HOLY TRIDUUM

We have come to the threshold of The Holy Triduum – The Three Days. These are the days when God moves most profoundly among us, the days when we enter most deeply into God’s movement. In word and symbol and gesture, we celebrate the mysteries of life and death and resurrection in company with the Risen Christ who shows us the way.

HOLY THURSDAY – April 18

Mass of the Lord’s Supper
7:30 pm – Church

The Gospel leaves no room for doubt – the most humble service given in love surrounds the gift of Christ’s Body and Blood. Feet are washed – a demanding gesture, at once a little messy, a little awkward, like many of love’s demands. Wine and bread are consecrated – enough bread for tomorrow when even sacraments are silent. Procession with the Eucharist from the church building to the altar of repose in Msgr. Heller Hall, accompanied by the Hispanic community. Adoration through the last hours of the day, until midnight when Friday’s fast begins.

GOOD FRIDAY – April 19

of the Lord’s Passion (Veneration of the Cross)
7:30 pm – Church

We come to stand with the women and the beloved disciple to listen to the Passion according to St. John. We pray with every man and woman and child in whom Christ is still suffering. We eat the Bread of Remembrance. A single cross is lifted high for our veneration together, then placed at the altar steps. Individual veneration of the cross when the celebration of the Lord’s Passion is over. We leave an empty church in silence.

EASTER VIGIL – April 20

“Mother of all vigils.” This is St. Augustine’s name for tonight, a name that conveys how the church cherishes this night that is different from any other. A vigil is a night watch: people who would normally be home resting are awake, gathered in expectation, waiting for news. We wait in a great company, as Christians around the world keep watch. Nothing is ordinary about this evening we spend together. The Vigil is long and full.

It begins outside with Fire, kindled in the presence of our elect and our candidates and those who accompany them. The Paschal Candle is ignited from that fire and carried into the darkened church where all our candles are lighted from that flame.

We hear the EXSULTET - THE EASTER PROCLAMATION. (Cont. Page Eight)

The Holy Triduum (Continued)

"This is the night when Christ broke the prison-bars of death and rose victorious from the grave."

In the light of the Easter candle, we listen to God's Word, the story of our salvation. Women and men from our assembly come, one after another, to proclaim the Word, readings announcing how God saves His people throughout history, pursuing us with unrelenting affection. These stories take time to tell and time to savor, and call us to respond in psalm and in prayer. The Gloria sounds again after Lenten silence, and the Alleluia. Lights are thrown on. Bells ring.

Led to faith by God's Word and by God's people, our elect come to be baptized. Water is blessed and poured over Erik Brendon Bond, Bryan Escobar, Lucas Guillen, Mateo Guillen, Jesse Ethan Heminger, Dylan Loayza, Kenneth Alan Messner, Bryan Velasco, Jovanny Velasco, and David Burns Westphal. They are wrapped in the white garment of Christ's life and are given the new light of Christ. Called to remember and renew our own baptism, we stand to embrace the saving waters. We acclaim our candidates as they reaffirm their baptism and, with the newly baptized, are sealed and confirmed with the oil of chrism. Together we taste and savor the Bread of Life – Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of the Risen Lord.

The Mother of all Vigils enfolds the Christian people, nourishes our Christianity, sends us out to embody Christ to the world.

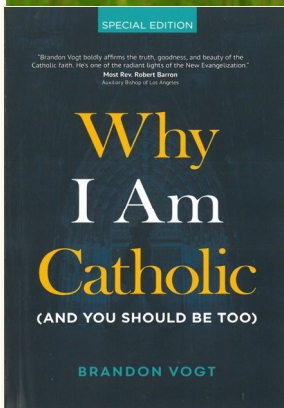
